

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PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT FROM SOPHIA ARMEN

DEAR PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE STUDENT VISIONARIES,

All I can say and all I hope you repeat to yourself as you read this and reflect on your own campus experience is: "It ain't gotta be this way, I will work to make it better."

My term as Associated Students President was a dynamic year in the association, a year of growth, strength, trying moments and survival. It was also a year of many firsts, history we cannot view as meaningless by any means, but part of the legacy of student activism we have inherited and to which we are indebted.

I was the first womyn to even run in Associated Students elections for the presidency in five years, meaning the entire context of elections in my own college career had ceilings and barriers that seemed impenetrable, and a culture that was defined as "unchangeable." My term also meant that I became the first Armenian womyn to be elected president in the history of the UC system. I state these facts not out of vanity but out of the desperate and urgent necessity to pay homage to those who struggled before me to get me here, and the honest reality of where we are at as a system, and as youth. I speak coming from a place of contradiction as I witnessed and experienced the paradox the university creates especially for those from historically marginalized histories. I speak because 2012-2013 was a year of transformation because of the selfless work of so many dedicated individuals on campus and in the community without whom this university would not run, including students, faculty, staff and workers. My firm commitment to justice and dignity on campus, is a fire that will not be cooled, and I know will only grow from here.

Since the very beginning, my office knew there was no time to waste as the accessibility and affordability of public higher education was under attack. During the July and August before my term began, UCSB went out in force to the UC Student Association and U.S. Student Association congresses, where UCSB students were instrumental in proposing the year's campaigns and networking with students across the nation. The situation was dire in higher education, as with the passage of **Proposition 30** in the upcoming election, tuition would rise immediately several hundred if not thousands of dollars, an unacceptable future that would mean many students would have to leave school.

It was in this atmosphere that my office organized and produced many projects, and while these words do little to express the depth of the resilience, creativity, laughter, compassion, and innovation that was demonstrated by the amazing folks in my office, I will shed light on a very few of our proudest moments. With the help of my passionate Chief of Staff Daniel Rojas and Commissioner Navkiran Kaur, we envisioned the **Student Activist Program (SAP)**, a new addition to the presidential fellowship that was a group internship of first years, second years, and transfer students to get the 101 on student activism at UCSB. The SAP-lings were familiarized with the inter-dynamics of student organizations, trained on campaign and event planning, directly engaged campus administration, were exposed to campus history and structures, and participated in weekly discussions and actions that emphasized their inner knowledge and agency. I am eternally grateful for seeing the growth of so many students in these experiences.

The A.S. Office of the President (ASOP) projects must be seen as collective efforts and I am so honored to have worked with such amazing individuals without whom none of this would have been possible. ASOP organized a successful voter education and registration campaign in collaboration with the show-stopping External Vice President, Local Affairs (EVPSA) office, and Volunteer Voter Registration Coalition. We also initiated the **Vote, Your Tuition Depends On It** campaign plastering the school with posters, going to register voters in the residence halls, and organizing a phone bank with EVPSA UCSB broke the record for the most registered voters yet again, registering over 11,000 students! Furthermore, we led the efforts to organize the **Walk Out, Teach In** event that highlighted the aftermath of the passing of Prop. 30. Working with workers, students, and staff, we called on students to walk out of class and gather in The Arbor. We broke down the power structure of the UC system — why tuition had risen 300% in the last four years, the marginalization of the student voice, and the connections between accessibility and race. Also, through the incredible utility of technology, we were able to Skype in a Chilean student activist to our outdoor teach-in who spoke on the turbulent Chilean student movement at the time and its focus on neoliberalism and the privatization of their public school systems. Many student attendees drew parallels between student movements worldwide.

Our office was one of the most active terms in recent history planning event after event and putting our full energies into engaging students in meaningful and tangible actions in *our* association. What started as a small idea turned into an impactful success as the Office of the President held three **Textbook Marketplaces** where students bought and sold their textbooks directly to other students to circumvent outrageous textbook prices. Especially through the work of Commissioner Adeel Lakhani and the Academic Affairs Board, students engaged in this mutually beneficial event that harnessed our collective power and provided very necessary relief especially to low income and middle income students.

The Office of the President also engaged with many issues surrounding representation of womyn and queer students on campus and **fighting sexual violence and rape culture** at UCSB. Although many were new to protest and direct action, our SAP-lings joined the office and members of De Colores, El Congreso, Black Students Union, the Women's Center, SSR, Take Back the Night and others, for an action in the bike loop in front of Storke Tower condemning sexual assault. Participants held signs including phrases like "Roofies Don't Equal Consent," "Men Against Rape," "Don't UC Us?," "Womyn of Color Against Rape," and "Stop Rape in the Queer Community."

Bringing more of our campus community directly into the decision-making process of the association was a top priority of the office. We launched the **Transparency and Student Engagement for Action (TEA) Initiative** with open office hours, a presidential meet and greet,

and presentations at events across campus. We gave active support and advocated for student organizations' events. Additionally, the Associated Students executives were committed to creating an inclusive and transparent association and organized an executive forum entitled **Student Power: Then and Now** as part of the 2012-2013 Human Rights Week. Originally in panel form, the execs then broke from the schedule and with the Living History Coordinator Mahader Tesafai, discussed the achievements of past student activists and facilitated discussion on real problems affecting students from misogynist landlords and Malcolm X Hall to tuition hikes and class availability.

My office drafted and supported dozens of resolutions in support of undocumented students, Black Student Union demands, divesting from fossil fuels, and resisting the UCOP tax. I am proud to say we held firm on where we thought our tuition dollars should and should not go.

The ASOP's most important commitment was to support student organizations and they were the priority in our funding decisions. We learned to be creative with little and that collaboration and collective power were more important than hoarding our budget. Lastly, by majority vote, my office became the first presidency in the UC system to co-sponsor the **Resolution to Divest from the Military Occupation of Palestine**, which at its height received an astounding 12-11-1 vote in the A.S. Senate. As an organizer on campus around this issue these last four years, participating in the 13+ hour meetings in the large Corwin Pavilion was an experience I will never forget.

After the succession of Senate meetings around the resolution to support divesting from the Israeli Occupation of Palestine, the office felt there was a desperate need for students to finally have their voices heard around issues of racism and campus climate, especially around issues of Islamophobia, sexism, and anti-Middle Eastern sentiment in general. We arranged for more than six administrators to have to sit through a panel of students of color and queer students discussing truly what the reality of campus climate was. We then put folks from the campus administration on the spot to directly answer questions from the audience at our event **Raise Your Voice: Town Hall on Diversity at UCSB**. The last portion was an open mic for any student to express their thoughts on diversity at UCSB, with people sharing powerful and courageous personal testimony that included experiences with micro-aggressions and sexual violence. The event was part of a two day series of Education then Action, as it was preceded by our event entitled **A Call to [Affirmative] Action: Students of Color** at the University of California attended by students and professors that outlined Proposition 209 and the history of diversity at the University of California.

We ended the year off strong by joining over 7,000 students from the University of California, California State University and Community College system to **protest ongoing budgetary concerns and exclusion**

of student power at the State Capitol in Sacramento. I was honored to be chosen to speak as only one of two UC students as the closing speaker to this crowd and highlighted that the passing of Prop 30 was not an end to our activism but the beginning. Furthermore, I called on students to not limit our vision in creating a just future: We don't just want to keep calling for an end to fee increases. We want our right to free and emancipatory education in California.

Even in our very last days we were out in the streets and walkways demanding the UC Regents meet with students to decide how resources should be allocated. I drafted a letter to the UC Regents demanding they hold their next meeting at UCSB. Passing around petitions and staging actions, we educated students and brought attention to our campaign. We condemned the lack of transparency and accessibility that resulted from the Regents strategically picking UCSF a graduate only and isolated campus for their meetings. Furthermore, as evidenced by our gruesome die-in in the Arbor, we called on the Regents to stop silencing student input in the allocation process of the Prop. 30 money that we as student voters largely made happen, pointing to the fact that the current structure of a single student vote on the UC Board of Regents is an illusion of shared governance.

Reminiscing just briefly reminds me how many incredible people and organizations I was blessed to work with. I am indebted to so many and I thank you for your wisdom, inspiration, and perseverance in the face of adversity. I want to first and foremost thank the incredible staff at A.S., all of whom have been the foundation of the association in so many ways. I cannot convey how grateful I am to Executive Director Marisela Márquez, Aaron Jones, and Mahader Tesafai for their constant guidance, support, and needed light-hearted relief in so many moments. A special thanks to my chief Daniel Rojas, Christy Ly, Navkiran Kaur, Katlen Abu Ata, Annie Alexandrian, Sally Oh, and all of my amazing office! Thank you to Elizabeth Robinson, Walid Afifi, Grace Chang, Academic Senate Chair Kum-Kum Bhavnani, Viviana "ViVi" Marsano from the MultiCultural Center, and many others for always reminding me of the humility and vision necessary for organizing. And most importantly, thank you to the students, the lifeblood of the association to whom I am endlessly grateful for their trust and the gift of the opportunity to serve them. Remember: "Whose university? Our university!"

As an elder comrade once gifted to me in conversation: the future will be decided by what our generation does and what it does not do. Indeed, "may we have the strength to envision a more just world; may we rise to make it reality."

STUDENT MOVEMENTS AND STUDENT RESILIENCE

//////////////////// FROM THE DESK OF DR. MARISELA MÁRQUEZ

One of the first times that I ever witnessed a public demonstration was on film. I viewed a documentary film of students protesting the U.S. policies in regard to the Vietnam war/conflict was shown in one of my political science classes that I was taking toward my Master of Arts in San Antonio Texas at St. Mary's University. I remember sitting in a darkened classroom and instantly crying after witnessing police use of batons on college students for demonstrating against the government policies.

Equally compelling is my memory of being physically sickened when viewing documentary footage of the Ohio state murders on the campus of Kent State on May 4, 1970. A massacre occurred on that date involving the shooting of unarmed college students by the National Guard of Ohio. The Ohio guardsmen reportedly fired many rounds over a period of 13 seconds killing four students and wounding nine others. Not all those shot were protesters of President Nixon's announcement that a new policy campaign named the Cambodian Campaign. He had announced this campaign a few days before the Kent State murders. Some of those killed were bystanders or observers from a distance. Subsequent to these killings, there were hundreds of universities, colleges, and high schools closed down due to protests throughout the U.S. — some set the number of participants as high as four million students. I'm reminded that the force and power of student movements can be quite fruitful in examining the strength and limits of a democratic society such as the United States.

These demonstrations instilled in me a great disdain for unexamined political actions *vis-à-vis* its citizenry overall, and its students in particular. It is no small coincidence that when it came time for me to narrow down my research interests for my dissertation for the Political Science Department in the late 1990s, I chose to write about the elements in U.S. society that illustrate a threshold of support or lack thereof for public expression/policies. My dissertation research came in very handy in the 2012-2013 academic year because a resolution was introduced into the student Senate which elicited a large contingency of support and non-support on the UCSB campus.



Students dialogued and disagreed upon the possibility of asking the UC to divest from companies that profit from the Israeli Palestinian conflict. Irrespective of the topic at hand, my responsibility as the Executive Director for A.S., which is to work with and for students is to ensure that they all have the opportunity to express themselves, while respecting the rights of others to do the same, was quite involved. Student leadership in Associated Students sought an avenue of expression that allowed each and every one who wanted to express themselves on the topic a forum by which to do so. The student Senate was the stage for the forum. The Senate quite literally provided the forum during Public Forum where the public is invited in to speak to the Senate about their concerns, wishes, aspirations, etc.

On two separate occasions the **Senate's public forum lasted all night long.** Students — both on Senate and in the audience. Students stayed up all night testifying and witnessing each other's contributions to the pluses and minuses of the proposed resolution(s).

The fact that they spent that many hours together was quite draining on everyone involved, but it did challenge the notion that students are not passionate about current political and social conditions. Most importantly, it ended peacefully. Disagreements were vented, disagreements were heard, and perhaps even some people's minds were changed; or not. I don't know for sure. Only they who as undergraduates chose to convene those hearings and participate as either audience members or testifier delivering a message of their own at public forum can express what those hearings meant to them. But for me, as someone who knows how badly these exchanges can go if they are not managed well, I called it a win for all concerned. There were no arrests; there was a beginning, a middle, and an end to the conversation/dialogue; votes were taken; one side or another lost. No one was entirely pleased with the outcome. However, it ended. It ended without bloodshed or confusion — and without intrusion in to the student processes from anyone. For all of that, I am extremely grateful and considerably appreciative of the opportunity to witness another generation of students speaking their minds and making active decision-making a part of their college experience.

Lock-In Passed for *The Bottom Line*

The Bottom Line is a weekly campus newspaper that began in 2007 in response to concerns that there should be multiple news sources on the UCSB campus. It provides a printed space for investigative journalism, culturally and socially aware commentary, and engaging reporting that addresses the diverse concerns of its readership, including UCSB and its surrounding community. It prides itself on being an inclusive learning environment for UCSB students interested in investigative journalism and media. The paper has grown over the years to include a management and editorial staff as well as enlisting almost 40 student writers, illustrators, photographers, and videographers.

This year UCSB students acknowledged *The Bottom Line's* quality reporting and service to the community by voting yes on a lock-in initiative of \$1.69 per student per quarter that assures the financial stability of the paper by helping to pay printing, equipment, and other production costs; and providing honoraria for the paper's management and editorial staff.

These are life-long skills and many students working in Program Board go on to work in the entertainment and media industries.

Lock-In Passed for COSWB

This year students passed a lock-in to support the work of the A.S. Commission on Student Well Being (COSWB). COSWB is committed to the general well being of UCSB undergraduates, with a particular emphasis on mental health. Its purpose is to increase awareness, educate, advocate, and serve as a reference point for student social services.

COSWB hosted a variety of events and programs. Free Fitness Tuesdays introduced participants to pilates, burlesque, yoga, hip hop cardio, kickboxing, and salsa aerobics. In collaboration with the A.S. Food Bank, Environmental Affairs Board, Health and Wellness interns, and Student Food Collective, COSWB hosted workshops that included how to make your own granola bars




using just a few healthy ingredients and how to make healthy trail mix.

COSWB presented UCSB professors Drs. John and Janet Baldwin who teach the popular class Sociology of Human Sexuality. They spoke about hook-up culture and sex in general in current society. The event was well attended and informative, covering topics critical for both the physical and mental health of the campus community. COSWB also co-sponsored a lecture by Allison Moore on Artivism, Art As Activism. She explored the politics, privileges, and identity issues involved with creating art and creativity in general.

CAB Travels to New Jersey and Arizona for Alternative Break

Each winter and spring break CAB interviews and invites students to spend an alternative break week volunteering somewhere around the U.S. In past years this has taken students to New Orleans to be part of Hurricane Katrina relief efforts and Florida for environmental restoration projects.

During winter break, Community Education Outreach Coordinator Allina Mojarro and students with Community Affairs Board Alternative Breaks traveled to New Jersey to help with the clean up after Hurricane Sandy, the second most costly hurricane in U.S. history. Students also fundraised. Combined with a matching grant from the Senate approximately \$3000 were raised to support the general relief efforts.



This spring, fourteen enthusiastic student volunteers traveled to Tucson to work at the Tucson Wildlife Center and Hoofprints of the Heart Horse Sanctuary. They spent four long days weeding, clearing brush around animal enclosures, cleaning up poop, learning about animal rescue, and enduring the dry heat. And at the end of it all, everyone came out with smiles on their faces and new friendships! CAB Alternative Break Co-Coordinator Kori Lay had this to say about the week's endeavors: "This was my second time leading an alternative break

trip and I always am so inspired by the participants who are willing to do any job or task thrown at us and they do it wholeheartedly. I felt like a proud mama."

California Prop. 30 Information Campaign

"We write today to the entire University of California community — students and their families, faculty and staff, alumni and friends — to express our relief and gratitude that the voters of California have approved Proposition 30. . . . Many of you worked hard to spread the word about Proposition 30. This is particularly true of students, who both registered tens of thousands of new voters and lobbied broadly on behalf of Proposition 30. As a public institution, we weren't allowed by law to advocate for how people should vote, but together we shared why Proposition 30 was of paramount importance to the University of California. It is clear that our message resonated."

These lines from a letter of thanks by UC President Mark Yudoff and the ten chancellors of the UC system to the UC community acknowledges the tireless efforts of Associated Students at UCSB and system-wide student campaigns to educate the public regarding this critical proposition placed on the November 2012 ballot by Governor Jerry Brown. Its passage helped stabilize the budgets of many state institutions of higher learning and the K-12 system by raising the sales tax and the income tax on wealthy individuals



in California with an annual income over \$250,000. The proposition was fiercely contested, but passed by a surprisingly wide margin. Its effects have been lasting.

A.S. worked with students and officials across campus to make sure voters had the information they needed to make an informed decision. As the letter states, this was not advocacy to vote in a particular manner and students worked hard to make sure theirs was a purely informational campaign. Clearly the presentation of the facts surrounding the proposition was enough to convince voters to support a measure that provides critical support to the entire UC system.

KCSB and The Bottom Line Convention Coverage



During fall quarter 2012, KCSB News and *The Bottom Line* news staff and students collaborated for two weeks to report directly from the Republican and Democratic National conventions. Two students — KCSB News Director Bianca Beltran and *The Bottom Line* Executive Managing Editor Annalise Domenighini — and two A.S. staff members — KCSB and *The Bottom Line* News Advisor Monica Lopez and Community Education Outreach Coordinator Allina Mojarro — traveled to Tampa, Florida and Charlotte, North Carolina to cover the conventions. Bianca and Annalise both produced written and audio content for KCSB and *The Bottom Line*. Monica and Allina were also on hand to report and engineer daily remote live broadcasts.

The group spent one week in Tampa covering events in and around the Republican National Convention. This coverage included protests

held in the Tampa area, and events inside the convention hall. The second week of coverage took the group to Charlotte to cover the Democratic National Convention.

In addition to reporting on the events themselves, students covered the social issues highlighted in the protests and rallies, and the political issues addressed by the presidential candidates Barack Obama and Mitt Romney. Just hours after immigration reform activists Kitzia Esteva (UCSB alumna) and her mother were released from custody, the news staff interviewed them for a live broadcast. They had been arrested by Charlotte police at the Democratic National Convention for an act of civil disobedience bringing attention to the Obama administration's deportation of record numbers of undocumented immigrants.

UC Divestment from Companies Supporting Israel's Actions With Regard to Palestinians

UC divestment from companies supporting Israel's actions with regard to the Palestinians was the most divisive issue addressed by the Senate this year. Although a resolution supporting divestment ultimately failed, it generated all night debates in the Senate.

UCSB is #1 Nationwide in Voter Registration Once Again

UCSB was once again the top university in the nation for voter registration this year. EVPSA Nadim Houssain's office worked with the Division of Student Affairs to win MTV's nationwide *Rock the Vote!* competition. The win brought Foo Fighters front-man and Nirvana drummer Dave Grohl to UCSB on June 2, 2013 to screen his new documentary *Sound City*, followed by a Q&A session.



BIKES Changes Name to Bike Committee

Bicycle Improvements Keep Everyone Safe (BIKES) got a new name this year. It's now simply the Bike Committee, or Bike Comm. The committee will continue to work with campus and local officials to make sure the UCSB and Isla Vista bike path systems are safe, well maintained, and expanded when needed, as well as to ensure there is plenty of on-campus parking for the thousands of eco-friendly bikes ridden by UCSB students, faculty, and staff.

Book Bank and Book Exchange



Spring quarter saw the grand opening of the A.S. Book Bank initiated and staffed by the A.S. Student Initiated Recruitment and Retention Committee (SIRRC). The year also saw the beginning of the A.S. Textbook Marketplace, a book exchange where students could buy and sell their used textbooks directly to each other. Organized by the A.S. Office of the President and the A.S. Academic Affairs Board, the marketplace was a one-day event and was repeated in spring quarter. The goal of both programs is to provide an alternative to sky-high textbook prices.

Walter Capps Memorial Park Fence



Until this past Spring Quarter, Walter Capps Memorial Park was the only bluff top park along Isla Vista's Del Playa Drive that didn't have some kind of fence or railing to help prevent people from falling off the cliff that borders these parks. EVPLA Rhandy Siordia and his office were instrumental in working with Santa Barbara County planners and 3rd District County Supervisor Doreen Farr to remedy this situation. The fence was eventually fully funded by the County and a donation of time by a local contractor. The result is a fence built in record time and added safety for UCSB students and visitors to Isla Vista.

Isla Vista Food Co-Op's Project We Own It Campaign

Associated Students gave the Isla Vista Food Co-op \$40,000 to complete their campaign to buy the property they had leased for many years. The lion's share came from IVTU with IVCRC, CAB, and EAB

making up the rest. The Co-op will reciprocate by providing food and storage to these groups and discounted food to the student community over a period of 5 years. A representative from the EVPLA office will also sit on the Co-op's board of directors for at least five years.

The Co-op was founded in 1972, with support from UCSB students. It's one of several local legacies of that generation of student community activists. Today it continues to provide students with food alternatives that are healthy, sustainable, locally grown, and tasty.



STATEMENTS OF FINANCIAL POSITION

Associated Students UCSB is dedicated to using its resources wisely to serve students and the larger community. These pages provide an overview of AS's finances. 



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
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
